What the Industry Needs

THE needs of the motion picture industry are too many and varied to deal with. But they may be summed up in one word, viz need for systematisation. During these past twenty-five years there has not been any sincere attempt made to give this trade a definite individuality and importance in the economic scheme of the country. And so, we hope, that the first concrete step in this direction will be made at the forthcoming Congress at Bombay. More than the Government help, we call upon the delegates assembling at the Congress to give serious thought to the question of systematising the progress of this trade. For our part, we suggest towards that end the immediate establishment of what may be called All India Film Institute, deriving its sanction from the trade as well as from the Government and functioning as the highest tribunal, effectively controlling, guiding and dictating the progress of every phase of the industry, to the mutual benefit of every unit comprising in this trade in India. It is open to the delegates to take up this idea, if worthwhile and work up details thereon or reject it, if they do not like. Nevertheless, we desire to exhort the delegates to hit upon some plan of solving the several problems confronting the trade in a bold but effective manner with a view to achieving the systematisation of the trade. That way lies the duty of the forthcoming Congress.

FILM LEAGUE'S ACTIVITIES

MADRAS, March, 22

THE deputation of the Madras Film League, consisting of the following members met the Hon'ble Mr. C. Rajagopalachariar, Prime Minister of Madras at the Secretariat, Fort St. George, Madras on 22nd March '39 and represented to him its views on the proposed Provincial Entertainment Tax.

Rajabushanam, (Managing Partner, Sree Radhakrishna Touring Talkies, Pithapuram, East Godavari Dt.): Mr. K. C. Chakko (Junior), (General Manager of touring talkies of Imperial, Gaiety, and Coronation) and Mr. V. Ramarao (Honorary Secretary, Madras Film League).

The following memorandum was submitted to the Prime Minister. Besides, the deputationists made representations of their grievances and difficulties, in relation to the proposed tax.

The Hon'ble Prime Minister gave a patient hearing and promised to give his consideration to the representations.

MEMORANDUM

To,

The Hon'ble Mr. C. Rajagopalachariar,
Respected Sir,

We the members of the deputation of the Madras Film League, (representing the film producers, distributors and exhibitors in Madras Presidency) beg to thank you for your kindness in permitting us to express our views on the proposed levy of tax on entertainments in the province.

Before we go into the terms and rates of the proposed taxation we beg to submit a few words on the present state of affairs in the motion picture industry in South India. We are sure you appreciate the fact that this industry is a potential indigenous trade and as such can play its part in the regeneration of our country. But we submit that its present state of progress is anything but satisfactory. Film production is now passing through an unheard of depression. Several studios have closed their doors, some for good, and the takings at the cinema theatres are so disappointing that the film business as a whole is in a miserable plight.

To add to all this, this industry in all its branches apart, from other general Taxes, has been particularly subject to innumerable

items of taxation from time to time. The industry pays among others the following taxes to the Government and to the other local authorities :

1. Film Censoring fees.
2. Tax on storing film.
3. Tax on running motors.
4. Vehicle tax on advertisement lorries treated as Motor lorries or goods vehicle even though they are running empty.
5. Electrical inspection fees.
6. Theatre license fees.
7. Public resort license fees.
8. Advertisement tax.

The latest burden namely advertisement tax on posters, vehicles, slides, sandwich boards and other means of advertisements, has completely paralysed the exhibition business in the city, while on account of want of rains resulting in famine in some areas and occurrence of cyclone in some others and general depression all round, film business in most of the districts is running at heavy losses.

In such peculiar and depressing circumstances comes now the Provincial Entertainment Tax. We beg to make it clear that we do not propose to dispute the principle of this measure as a source of income to the Government. But we do emphatically state that the present time is the most inopportune for this tax. Moreover, the Government have not given sufficient time to public and to film business people, spread over the different corners of the presidency to understand the implications of this measure and express their difficulties with regard to the various aspects of the bill. Therefore, we beg to request the Government that they may be pleased to postpone taking up this measure by an year so that in the meantime it may enable the Government to study the situation and find out whether this industry can bear this additional taxation. But if the Government should, in any circumstances, find it absolutely impossible to postpone the enforcement of the tax, we beg to submit that you will kindly consider our suggestions so that the Act may not work hardship on the industry.

As already mentioned in our recent communication to the Government, we are deeply concerned over the rates of the tax and so we venture to suggest that the purpose of the Government will be served by retaining the existing rates and at the same time provincialising the Act by which means the revenue to the Government through this source shall become very much augmented because the Act will apply to several centres where the tax had not been in force hitherto.

We hope that you appreciate that cinema is the poor man's amenity and offers especially in the Districts a healthy diversion for the poor people from the evils of drink because it is the only form of cheap entertainment available to them. And so, a fresh

MADRAS ENTERTAINMENT TAX, 1939

THE Madras Entertainment Tax Bill 1939, was passed in the Madras Legislative Assembly on Friday 31st March 1939. The Act will come into force shortly.

The following are the provisions of the Bill.

PROVISIONS

Whereas it is expedient to provide for the levy by the provincial government of a tax on amusements and other entertainments, to repeal the Madras Local Authorities Entertainments Tax Act 1926, and to provide for the payment of compensation to local authorities now levying a tax under the Act aforesaid; it is hereby enacted as follows:

1. (1) This act may be called the Madras Entertainments Tax Act, 1939.

(2) It extends to the whole of the province of Madras.

(3) This section shall come into force at once, and the rest of this Act shall come into force on such date as the provincial Government may, by notification in the Official Gazette, appoint.

2. The Madras Local Authorities Entertainments Tax Act 1926, is hereby repealed:

DEFINITIONS

3. In this Act, unless there is anything repugnant in the subject or context.

(1) "admission" includes admission as a spectator or as one of an audience, and admission for the purpose of amusement by taking part in an entertainment;

(2) "admission to an entertainment" includes admission to any place in which an entertainment is held;

(3) "agriculture" includes horticulture and the breeding of animals of every description;

(4) "entertainment" includes any exhibition, performance, amusement, game, sport, or race to which persons are admitted for payment;

(5) "local authority" means the corporation of Madras, or a municipal council or a local board constituted under any enactment for the time being in force;

(6) "payment for admission includes—

(a) any payment made by a person who, having been admitted to one part of a place of entertainment, is subsequently admitted to another part thereof, for admission to which a payment involving a tax or a higher tax is required;

(b) any payment for seats or other accommodation in a place of entertainment: and

(c) any payment for any purpose whatsoever connected with an entertainment which a person is required to make as a condition of attending or continuing to attend the entertainment in addition to the payment, if any, for admission to the entertainment;

(7) "prescribed" means prescribed by rules made under this Act;

(8) "proprietor" in relation to any entertainment includes any person responsible for the management thereof; and

(9) "institution" includes a company, society, club or other association of persons by whatever name called.

Tax on payments for admission to Entertainments

4. Except or otherwise expressly provided in this Act, there shall be levied, and paid to the provincial Government, on all payments for admission to any entertainment, a tax hereinafter referred to as the entertainments tax at the following rates, namely:—

Where the payment, excluding the amount of the tax—

(i) is not more than two annas—three pies.

(ii) is more than two annas but less than six annas—six pies.

(iii) is six annas or more but is less than twelve annas—one anna.

(iv) is twelve annas or more but is less than one rupee eight annas—two annas.

(v) is one rupee eight annas or more but is less than two rupees eight annas—four annas.

(vi) is two rupees eight annas or more but is less than three rupees eight annas—eight annas.

(vii) is three rupees eight annas or more but is less than four rupees eight annas—twelve annas,

(viii) is four rupees eight annas or more but is less than six rupees eight annas—one rupee.

(ix) is six rupees eight annas or more but is less than nine rupees eight annas—one rupee eight annas.

(x) is nine rupees eight annas or more but is less than ten rupees—two rupees.

(xi) is ten rupees or more—for the first ten rupees and for every ten rupees or part of ten rupees over ten rupees—two rupees.

Composition and consolidated payment of tax.

5. The Provincial Government may, on the application of the proprietor of any entertainment in respect of which the entertainments tax is payable under section 4 allow the proprietor on such conditions as they may lay down—

(a) to compound the tax payable in respect of such entertainment for a fixed sum; or

(b) to pay the amount of the tax due by means of a consolidated payment at such percentage of the gross proceeds

received by the proprietor on account of payments for admission to such entertainment and an account of the tax, as the Provincial Government may fix.

Admission to entertainments.

6. (1) Save in the cases referred to in section 5, no person shall be admitted for payment to any entertainment where the payment is subject to the entertainments tax except—

- (a) with a ticket stamped with an impressed, embossed, engraved or adhesive stamp (not previously used) issued by the Provincial Government and indicating proper seat for such ticket or
- (b) in special cases, with the approval of the Provincial Government, through a barrier which, or by means of a mechanical contrivance which, automatically registers the number of persons admitted,

unless the proprietor of the entertainment has made arrangements approved by the Provincial Government for furnishing returns of the payments for admission to the entertainment and has given security upto an amount and in a manner approved by the Provincial Government for the payment of the entertainments tax.

(2) Nothing in sub-section (1) shall be deemed to preclude the Provincial Government from requiring security from the proprietor of an entertainment for the payment of the entertainments tax in any other case.

Manner of payment of tax.

7. (1) The entertainments tax shall be levied in respect of each person admitted for payment, and in the case of admission by stamped ticket, shall be paid by means of the stamp on the ticket, and in the case of admission otherwise than by stamped ticket, shall be calculated and paid on the number of admissions.

(2) The entertainments tax in the case of admission otherwise than by stamped ticket, shall be recoverable from the proprietor.

(3) Where the payment for admission to an entertainment is made wholly or partly by means of a lump sum paid as a subscription or contribution to any society, or for a season ticket or for the right of admission to a series of entertainments or to any entertainment during a certain period of time, the entertainments tax shall be paid on the amount of the lump sum, but where the Provincial Government are of opinion that the payment of a lump sum or any payment for a ticket represents payment for other privileges, rights or purposes besides the admission to an entertainment during any period during which the tax has not been in operation, the tax shall be levied on such an amount as appears to the Provincial Government to represent the right of admission to entertainments in respect of which the entertainments tax is payable.

Entertainments exempted from payment of tax.

8. (1) The entertainments tax shall not be levied on payments for admission to any entertainment where the Provincial Government are satisfied—

(a) that the entire gross proceeds of the entertainment are devoted to philanthropic, religious or charitable purposes without any charge on such proceeds for any expenses of the entertainment; or

(b) that the entertainment is of a wholly educational character; or

(c) that the entertainment is provided for purposes which are partly educational or partly scientific or cultural by a society not conducted or established for profit; or

(d) that the entertainment is provided by a society not conducted for profit and established solely for the purpose of agriculture or of a manufacturing industry, and consists solely of an exhibition of articles which are of material interest in connexion with questions relating to public health or agriculture, or of the industry for promoting the interests of which the society exists or of the materials, machinery, appliances or foodstuffs in the production of those products.

(2) The Provincial Government may, by general or special order, exempt any entertainment or class of entertainments from liability to the entertainment tax.

Refunds in certain cases.

9. Where the Provincial Government are satisfied that the whole of the net proceeds of an entertainment are devoted to philanthropic, religious or charitable purposes, and that in calculating the net proceeds, not more than twenty-five per cent of the gross proceeds have been deducted on account of the expenses of the entertainment, they shall repay to the proprietor the amount of the entertainments tax paid in respect of the entertainment.

Manner of recovery of tax.

10. Any amount due on account of the entertainments tax may be recovered by the Provincial Government as if it were an arrear of land revenue.

Inspection

11. (1) (a) Any officer authorized by the Provincial Government in this behalf may enter any place of entertainment while the entertainment is proceeding, and any place of entertainment at any place ordinarily used as a place of entertainment at any reasonable time, for the purpose of seeing whether the provisions of this Act or any rules made thereunder are being complied with.

(b) Every officer so authorized shall be deemed to be a public servant within the meaning of section 21 of the Indian Penal Code.

(2) The proprietor of every entertainment or the owner or person in charge of any place ordinarily used as a place of entertainment shall give every reasonable assistance to the inspecting officer in the performance of his duties under sub-section (1),

(3) If any person prevents or obstructs the entry of the inspecting officer, he shall, in addition to any other punishment to which he is liable under any law for the time being in force, be punished with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees.

Exemption from payment for admission

12. The officer referred to in section 11 or any other officer who has to enter any place of entertainment in pursuance of a duty imposed upon him by or under this Act or any other law shall not be required to pay for his admission to the entertainment.

Payment of compensation to local authorities

13. (1) From the proceeds of the tax collected under this Act every year, there shall be paid to each of the local authorities which were in receipt of any income from the tax levied under the Madras Local Authorities Entertainment Tax Act, 1926, during any part of the three years preceding the 1st April 1939, a sum equivalent to the average net annual income derived by such local authority during those three years from the tax so levied.

(2) The Provincial Government shall determine the sums which should be paid to local authorities under sub-section (1) and their determination shall be final.

Provided that from the amount payable under this sub-section to any local authority for the first year after the commencement of this Act, the net income derived by the authority from any tax levied on and after the 1st April of that year under the Madras Local Authorities Entertainments Tax Act, 1926, shall be deducted.

“Explanation: In this sub-section, ‘year’ shall mean the financial year.”

Penalties

14. The proprietor of any entertainment who—

(a) admits any person for payment to any place of entertainment in contravention of the provisions of section 6, or

(b) fails to pay the tax due from him within the time prescribed, or fraudulently evades the tax

(c) contravenes any of the provisions of this Act, shall, on conviction by a Magistrate, be liable in respect of each such offence to a fine which may extend to five hundred rupees, and shall in addition, be liable to pay any tax which should have been paid.

Power to compound offences

15. The prescribed authority may accept from any person who has committed or is reasonably suspected of having committed an offence against this Act, by way of composition of such offence—

(a) where the offence consists of the failure to pay, or the evasion of, any tax payable under this Act, in addition to the tax so payable, a sum of money not exceeding five hundred rupees or double the amount of the tax payable, whichever is greater, and

(b) in other cases, a sum of money not exceeding five hundred rupees.

Power to make rules

16. (1) The Provincial Government may make rules for securing the payment of the entertainments tax and generally for carrying into effect the purposes of this Act.

(2) In particular and without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing power, they may make rules—

(a) for the supply and use of stamped or embossed tickets, or for the stamping or embossing of tickets, sent to be stamped or embossed, and for securing the defacement of stamps when used ;

(b) for the use of tickets covering the admission of more than one person and the calculation of the tax thereon ; and for the payment of the tax on the transfer from one part of a place of entertainment to another, and on payments for seats or other accommodation ;

(c) for controlling the use of barriers or mechanical contrivances (including the prevention of the use of the same barrier or mechanical contrivance for payment of a different amount) and for securing proper records of admission by means of barriers or mechanical contrivances ;

(d) for the checking of admissions, the keeping of accounts and the furnishing of returns by the proprietors of entertainments to which the provisions of section 5 are applied or in respect of which the arrangements approved by the Provincial Government for furnishing returns are made under section 6 ;

(e) for the renewal of damaged or spoiled stamps and for the procedure to be followed on applications for refund under this Act or under the rules made thereunder ;

(f) for the keeping of accounts of all stamps used under this Act ;

(g) for the presentation and disposal of applications for exemption from payment of the entertainments tax, or for the refund thereof, made under the provisions of this Act ;

(h) for the collection of the entertainments tax under this Act and the powers to be exercised by the officers of the Provincial Government in that behalf ;

(i) for authorizing any local authority to collect the entertainments tax on behalf of the Provincial Government in the area within the jurisdiction of the local authority or any part of such area, for the payment of a commission to the local authority for making the collection, and for the powers to be exercised by the officers of the local authority in connexion with such collection ;

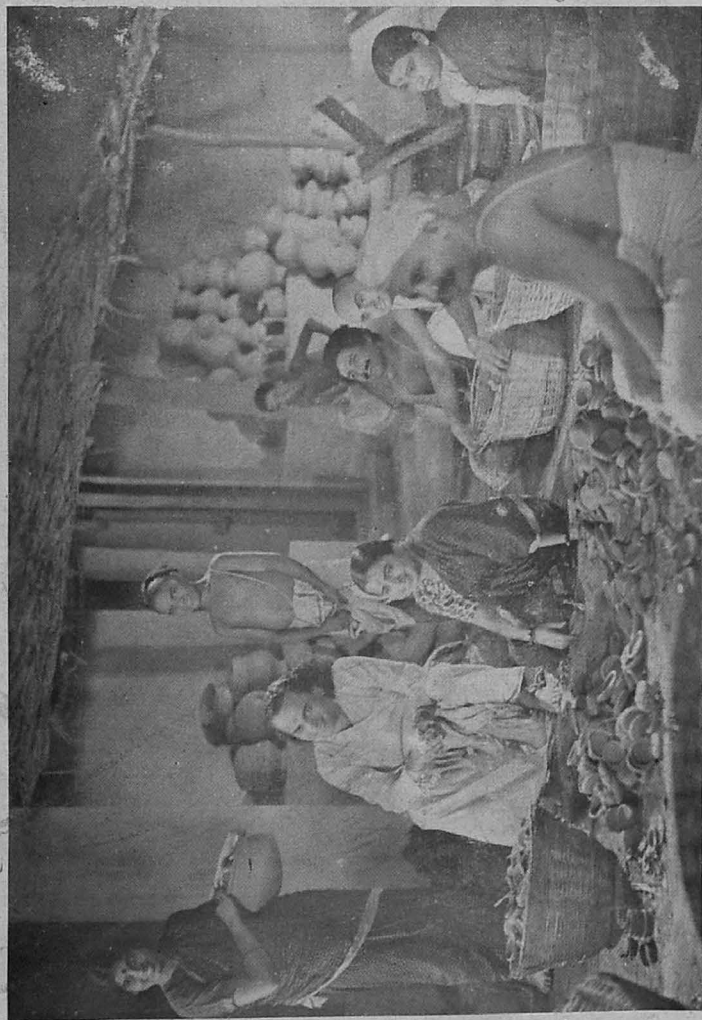

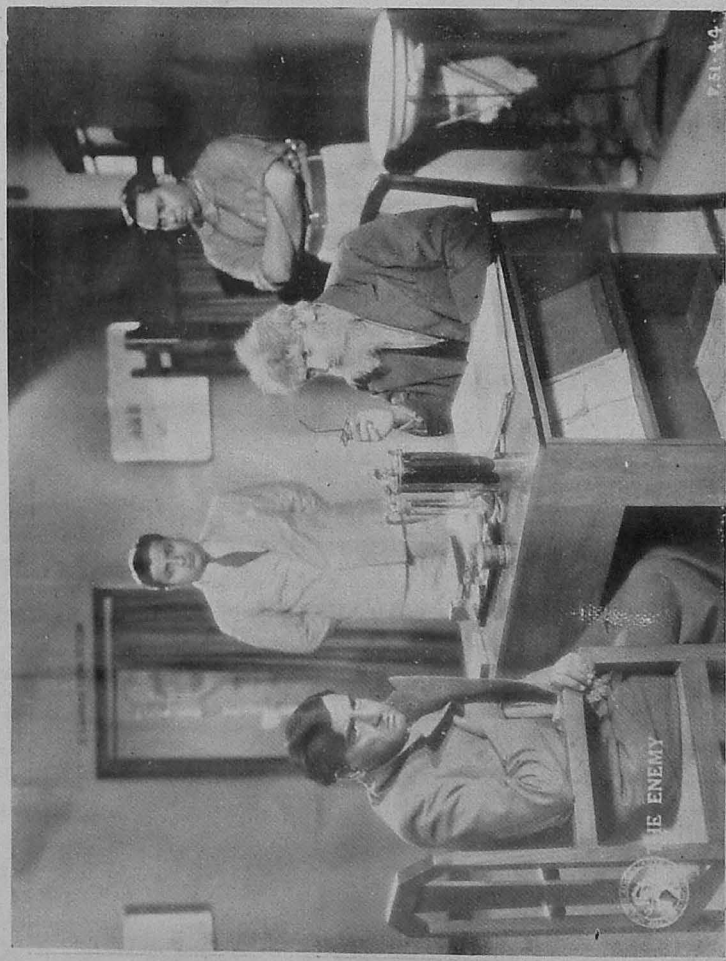

(j) for the issue of passes by proprietors of entertainments for the admission of officers who have to perform any duty in connexion therewith or any other duty imposed upon them by law; and

(k) for any other matter for which provision in this Act and for which provision is, in the opinion of the Provincial Government, necessary for giving effect to the purposes of the Act.

(3) In making a rule under sub-section (1) or sub-section (2), the Provincial Government may provide that a breach thereof shall be punishable with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees.

(4) All rules made under this section shall be published in the Official Gazette, and on such publication shall have effect as if enacted in this Act.

Bar of certain proceedings

17. (1) No suit, prosecution or other proceeding shall lie against any officer or servant of the Provincial Government, for any act done or purporting to be done under this Act, without the previous sanction of the Provincial Government.

(2) No officer or servant of the Provincial Government shall be liable in respect of any such act in any civil or criminal proceeding, if the act was done in good faith in the course of the execution of duties or the discharge of functions imposed by or under this Act.

Limitation for certain suits and prosecutions

18. No suit shall be instituted against the Crown and no suit, prosecution or other proceeding shall be instituted against any officer or servant of the Provincial Government in respect of any act done or purporting to be done under this Act, unless the suit, prosecution or other proceeding is instituted within six months from the date of the act complained of.

Proceedings, etc., against collecting the tax

19. If any local authority has been authorized under this Act to collect the entertainments tax on behalf of the Provincial Government, the provisions of sections 17 and 18 shall apply in regard to the officers and servants of such authority in the same manner as they apply in regard to the officers and servants of the Provincial Government.

Power to delegate certain powers

20. (1) The Provincial Government may, by notification in the Official Gazette, delegate all or any of their powers under this Act except those conferred upon them by sub-section (3) of section 1, section 16 and this section, to any person or authority subordinate to the Provincial Government and may in like manner withdraw any power so delegated.

(2) The exercise of any powers delegated under sub-section (1) shall be subject to such restrictions, limitations and conditions, if any, as may be laid down by the Provincial Government, and shall also be subject to control and revision by them,

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS

The object of this Bill is to provide for the levy by the Provincial Government of a tax on amusements and other entertainments. Such a tax is now being levied in Bengal, Bombay, Bihar, the United Provinces and the North-West Frontier Province. Certain local bodies in this Presidency are now levying a tax under the Madras Local Authorities Entertainments Tax Act, 1926 (Madras Act V of 1927). It is proposed to repeal this Act and to provide for the levy of a provincial tax throughout the Presidency, the local bodies now levying the tax being duly compensated by the payment to them of a sum equivalent to the average net annual income derived by them from the tax during the three years 1936-37, 1937-38 and 1938-39.

The tax will be levied on all payments for admission to entertainments at rates representing approximately about $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent of such payments. The provisions in the Bill are mostly based on those contained in the Madras Local Authorities Entertainments Tax Act, 1926. Certain provisions based on the Acts of other Provinces have also been added.

FILM INVENTION IN AUSTRALIA

Stereoscopic Movie Screen Patented

World patents on a new stereoscopic motion picture screen are being taken out by L. G. Pimblett of Sydney.

Mr. Pimblett's screen comprises a ground glass through which the light is filtered on to a bevelled mirror. By placing the ground glass at an angle to the mirror correct perspective or depth is obtained without any loss of focus.

Pictures may also be shown in broad daylight with the new screen.

The inventor says he has received many offers from financial interests to exploit the invention overseas. At a recent demonstration to lecturers from Sydney University and motion picture interests, spotlight was directed on the screen without affecting the clarity of the picture.

TRIBUTE TO SOUTH INDIAN FILM PRODUCERS

MR. K. BABURAO POI, a partner in the Prabhat Films Ld, and a Vice-Chairman of the Reception Committee of the Indian Motion Picture Congress to be held at Bombay at the end of this month, paid a tribute on April 7 to South Indian film producers for their individuality and enterprise.

Members of the Provincial Subjects Committee of the Congress met Mr. Baburao Poi at a tea party at the Connemara Hotel yesterday. There was a large gathering of film producers and exhibitors. After tea a meeting was held. Mr. G. Ramabrahmam, who presided, welcomed Mr. Baburao Poi to Madras.

Mr. K. Subramaniam, a film director, appealed to South Indian producers and exhibitors to join the Congress.

Mr. BABURAO POI, addressing the meeting, referred to the importance of the Indian film industry and said that after "struggling valiantly for twentyfive years, the industry has reached a stage when we can safely say it has come to stay".

A COMMON PLATFORM

Referring to the proposed Congress, he said, "The essential idea underlying the Congress is to provide a common platform to all people working in the Industry for exchanging ideas and for taking firm and wise decisions for the future so that those in the industry may not commit the mistakes of the past. This great purpose can be achieved only if the forthcoming Congress is attended by delegates from every part of India with the sole aim of helping the Indian Film Industry fulfil its purpose better than at present and of making it more indigenous and more stable than it is.

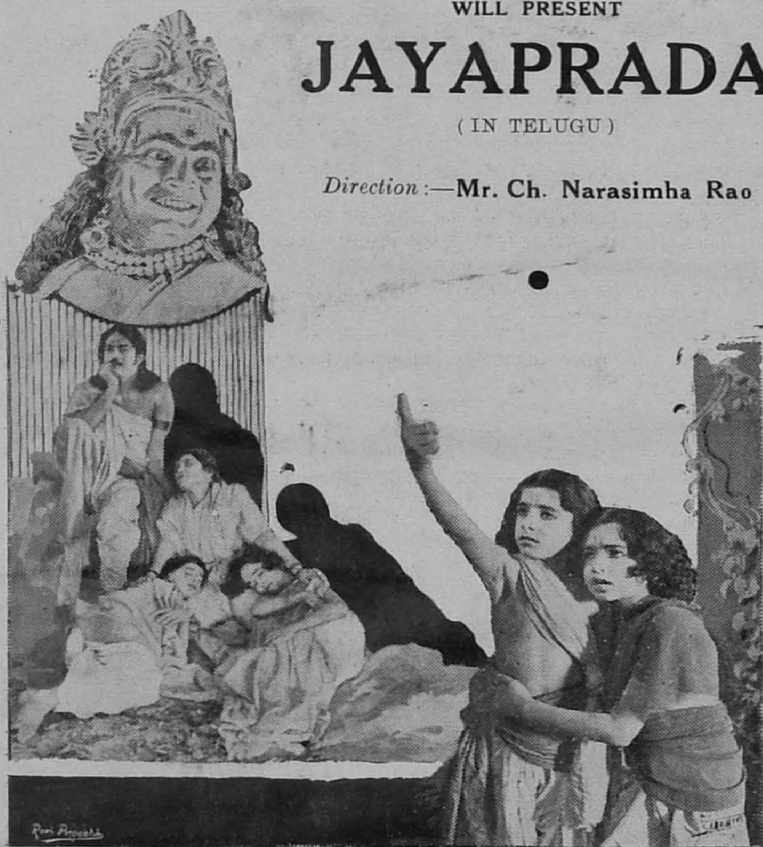

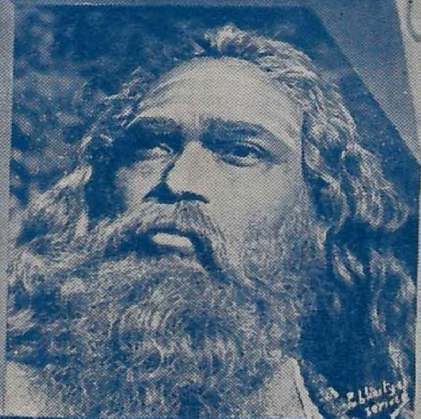
